Our mission is to honor America's Veterans as heroes by providing the highest quality health care.



Martinsburg VAMC Receives Green Award



The Martinsburg VA Medical Center Green Environmental Management System (GEMS) committee received the 2014 Green Award, presented by Berkeley Community Pride. The award recognizes the environmentally friendly initiatives and programs the medical center incorporates into its daily operations. The medical center’s green programs include on-site composting of food waste, solar-powered charging stations for the facilities electric utility vehicle fleet and various recycling activities. “People outside our facility are not aware of the environmental stewardship that takes place here on a daily basis,” said Robert Moore, GEMS program manager. “This award recognizes the hard work, energy and creativity our staff put into developing conservation initiatives.” One of the green initiatives engineered at the facility is a vehicle wash bay, which uses rainwater settled from the roofs of nearby buildings for vehicle washing and on-site landscape management.
